Many schools use *Australian Catholics* as a tool in the RE classroom and other faith formation activities. Here are some of the ways the magazine is used:

- Setting a particular article as reading, using the reflection questions and activities on our website to encourage students to look more deeply at the themes covered
- Set students to read the articles as a fun way to start classroom discussions, debates, plays and writing exercises.
- Encourage students to enter our Young Journalist Award, or join our young writers community and submit articles to the magazine or e-newsletter
- Using our archived content to research RE assignments, explore issues in more depth and deepen understanding of the Catholic faith knowing that all content is in line with Catholic teaching.

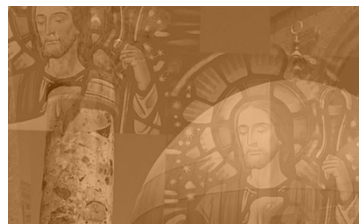
Encouraging students to commit to doing 12 things for refugees over the Advent period.

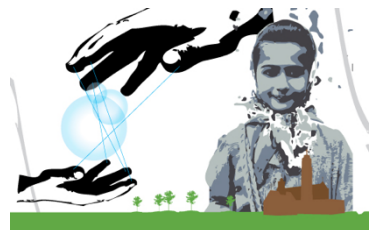
Perth student Vincent Pettinicchio, who started an outreach project for the homeless when he was in Year 3.
