What are shared sacred spaces?

In many places like universities, airports, and hospitals, there are special rooms or areas called 'multifaith spaces.' These are places where people from different religions can pray and feel welcome. They help people with different beliefs share their prayer experiences and learn from each other.

Jerusalem: A city of shared sacred spaces

The city of Jerusalem is very special because it is important to three religions: Christianity, Islam and Judaism. These religions have special sites in Jerusalem where they pray and remember their faith. For example:

- The Temple Mount is a holy place for both Jews and Muslims. It has the Al-Aqsa Mosque and the Dome of the Rock, which are important to Muslims, and it is also where the Jewish First and Second Temples stood.
- The Western Wall is a sacred place for Jews, but it is also important to Christians and Muslims because it is part of the Holy Temple in Jerusalem.
- The Church of the Holy Sepulchre is a place that brings Christians together, as they believe it is the site of Jesus' crucifixion and resurrection.

Even though Jerusalem is a beautiful place, it can also be a place of conflict because people sometimes disagree about religious beliefs. But, the sacred sites in the city show that there are ways religions can share space and learn from each other.

Oxford University Chapel: A modern example

At Oxford University, there is a chapel called Sommerville College Chapel. It is different because it was built to be a place where all people, no matter their religion, can pray. The chapel was created to be open to everyone, with no specific religious symbols. Later, the chapel added some Christian symbols, but it still remains a place for people of all faiths.

Why are shared sacred spaces important?

These special spaces help people talk to each other and understand different religions. They help break down the walls between people and make it easier to build friendships, even if they don't agree on everything. These spaces are important in showing that we can all respect and learn from each other, no matter what religion we follow.

Sommerville College Chapel:

- Built as a place where everyone, regardless of religion, could pray.
- Started as a neutral space, and later added Christian symbols, but remains open to all faiths.
